

Over 218 Students Graduate from LaRRI Online Course

Windhoek- 11 December 2025 - More than 218 students recently graduated from the Labour Resource and Research Institute (LaRRI) online course, in a ceremony held in Windhoek on Friday. The event was part of the worker education program sponsored by the Mineworkers Union of Namibia (MUN) and its affiliated stakeholders.

The graduation ceremony was themed “Building Safer Fair Workplace Together: Transforming the Workplace Through Empowered Workers.” It celebrated the dedication and perseverance of students who completed their Labour Studies Level 4 accredited by the Namibia Qualifications Authority (NQA).
